
# WIDE RAINBOW LESSONS: Artist Lynda Benglis

### **ARTIST INTRO:**

Lynda Benglis (B. 1941) is a celebrated American artist and sculptor working with experimental and found materials. Benglis was raised in Louisiana and moved to New York in 1964. Trained as a painter, she preferred using wax to paint and came to attention with her poured-latex floor works in the 1960-1970s. She continues to explore new and playful forms of sculpture today including recent works made of paper, chicken wire, paint, and glitter. For more than fifty years she has been a pioneer of sculpture and has been exhibited widely over the years. Her work is found in major private and public museum collections today.

## **ARTWORK:**

#### WORKSHOP:

Let's break away from painting and create "sparkle paper" sculptures inspired by artist Lynda Benglis!

- 1. Start with your materials find the right size of wire for your sculpture's structure, then gather color glitter, glue, paper and water
- 2. Form your wire into interesting shape, it can be anything!
- 3. Mix your glue and water together in a bin or bowl
- 4. Wet your paper until it becomes sticky and flexible
- 5. Mold it on to your wire, add layers of paper and color glitter
- 6. Let dry and continue to apply more paper, flitter until you think your artwork is finished
- 7. Share your process and sculpture with friends, family, or fellow students

## MATERIALS:

- Mesh or Chicken Wire
- Wire Cutters
- Glitter
- Glue
- Paper
- Water & Bowl
- Optional: Paint & Brushes
