WIDE RAINBOW LESSONS: Artist Mickalene Thomas

ARTIST INTRO:

Mickalene Thomas (b. 1971) is a contemporary African-American artist based in Brooklyn, NY. Thomas received her BFA from Pratt Institute and her MFA from Yale School of Art. She is best known for her layered portraits, collages, and elaborate paintings made of rhinestones, acrylic, and enamel. Thomas' work draws from art history and popular culture exploring themes of femininity, beauty, power, race, and gender. She is a queer woman of color representing women of color by celebrating family, friends, celebrities, and other iconic historical figures in her portraits. Thomas has been widely exhibited and her artwork is included in many major museum collections. She continues to make powerful portraits today and co-founded *The Josie Club* which is a support network for queer female artists of color to help support, fundraise and sponsor their work.

WORKSHOP:

- 1. Think of an extraordinary woman in your life that you'd like to honor, celebrate, and show the world!
- 2. Invite that woman to sit for your portrait or use your own imagination ©
- 3. Set the stage by arranging chairs, fabrics, textures, and objects around your home to as a backdrop for your portrait
- 4. Begin to draw your portrait and the surrounding space (use colored pencils, markers, crayons, or whatever you'd like)
- 5. Cut, paste and layer other materials like pieces of fabric, paper, and glitter to decorate your space while you bring your portrait to life!
- 6. Share your portrait with friends & family to honor that special woman.
